Looking back, the Northwest Regional Library System (NORWELD) has endured many changes over the past twelve months. At the Director's Roundtable last December, Toni Whitney was welcomed as the newly appointed Executive Director. Prior to that, Erica Pax was hired as the Emerging Technology Educator, and in the fall of this year, Angie Babcock joined the NORWELD staff as Office Manager.

The NORWELD Board also experienced changes due to

expiring term limits and resignations. Morgan Paul, Rhett Grant, and Matt Ross joined the Board after resignations of others. Rebecca Coker was elected in June with the six-year term served by Sam Norris expiring. Among many items of business, the NORWELD Board approved changes to the NORWELD Bylaws after member's input.

Website transformation was a high priority with reorganization and additional tools added to make access to information faster and easier for visitors. Online request forms for borrowing of materials was streamlined, making access more seamless for local library staff.

To gain valuable insight from member directors, a Member Satisfaction Survey was conducted during the year which will enable our staff to gauge the effectiveness of services, programming, and resources.

Learning opportunities included many nationally known speakers or authors such as Sam Quinones, Ryan Dowd, Mary Lou Carolan, and Joseph N. Gross.

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These experts spoke on a variety of topics to broaden our knowledge and strengthen our expertise on trending issues such as the Opioid epidemic, homelessness, building community, and legal issues.

Popular training opportunities such as the annual Summer Reading Workshop, Mental Health First Aid, Puppetry in Story Times, and the like, were well attended.

Roundtables for directors and fiscal officers were held throughout the year and many took the opportunity afforded to join the conversation and networking.

Whitney introduced and facilitated the New Directors
Forums for library administrators new to the position.

Funding through an LSTA grant in the amount of \$19,995 was used to purchase STEM/STEAM kits, provide continuing education, and update the Laptop Lab. Kits created include coding related toys and robotics such as Lego Boost, Creative Toolbox, Ozobot EVO Classroom, little-Bits Code STEAM and STEM Kits, and more. Kits are available for borrowing by full-member libraries as new technologies are introduced locally.

With cutting edge library services and the trend for E-sports in the library, we invited Tristin Wheeler, audio visual and event planning specialist for Cleveland Public Library, to present a program on E-sports in the Library, an inter-active event with plenty of time for Q & A's.

A Performer's Showcase held recently was wildly popular and benefited librarians as they begin to plan for the 2019 summer activities.

During the year, state budget cuts necessitated a rate increase in membership fees for the system. Rates had remained unchanged for many years and the decision was carefully weighed by administration and the Board. The increase has enabled NORWELD to continue providing services and resources.

#### 2019 Summer Reading Workshop

Registration is open for the 2019 Summer Reading workshop. It will be on March 8th at St Mark's Lutheran Church in Bowling Green. With the space theme of, "A Universe of Stories, " and the celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Apollo Moon Landing, the day will be an out-of-this-world experience! There will be games, songs, guest visitors, and PRIZES. All will be designed to help you get your summer reading program toblast off-into success!

### Play Your Way to Literacy Through STEM and Musical Madness!

Mark your calendars for a two-day extravaganza of fun and learning for Youth Services staff! The dates are April 16 & 17, and the event will be held at Sawmill Creek Resort in Sandusky, Ohio. NORWELD and NEO-RLS are partnering to bring back Dr. Betsy Diamant-Cohen of Mother Goose On the Loose to lead the first day of this workshop. On day one, you will learn why play is important; how to connect playful activities across school readiness domains to spark multiple intelligences; how to collaborate with colleagues to explore new ways to infuse storytimes with STEM and the Arts; how to build early literacy, social/emotional, and school readiness skills; match play with storytimes in ways that encourage parents and caregivers to become play partners and enjoy playful learning. The second day will be filled with music as Beverly Meyer, "the Music Lady", takes you on a journey to become more musical (even if you think you aren't). The day will end with a session of networking, crafting, and using the skills you've learned. Watch for registration to open soon!

#### Youth Mental Health First Aid

Do you have tweens and teens in your library? Of course, you do! Do you know what to say or how to help one that is hurting or needs help? This course will teach you how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing mental health or addictions challenge or is in crisis. Youth Mental Health First Aid is primarily designed for adults who regularly interact with young people. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Topics covered include anxiety, depression, substance use, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (including AD/HD), and eating disorders.
